#### FRIDAY WALKERS

This session we have been back to more of our usual type of walking – the organised programme type, for which we thank Nick and Susan for cajoling us into producing a set of walks. At the end of May, Janet organised a walk from Leigh which was designated the "George Holt Memorial Walk" finishing at the Fleur de Lis, Leigh. We were pleased to have Valerie (George's wife) and Keith (his son) join us at the pub. At the beginning of June, Sue Westlake led what I think turned out to be the wettest walk of the year from Hadlow. Only five of us walked and only two stayed for lunch – everybody else was soaked to the skin! Celestine led from Langton Green on a day when the forecast was horrendous – thunderstorms and heavy rain – however, the weather was mostly OK but it tipped it down for the last half mile. Sheila led from Capel Church – a lovely walk which she cut short a bit as the group was getting really strung out – the first time I can remember that happening to the Friday Group walkers. On to July where John and Evelien walked from the Tickled Trout at Teston – I reckon John deserved some sort of medal because of the severe undergrowth pruning he had

to do to get us through some sections. One of our regular walks cropped up in July – from the Kentish Horse at Markbeech. This is traditionally a mud bath through the Newtye Hurst Wood section – it didn't disappoint, despite a change of timing to the summer months. A write up for this walk describes it as "a walk for spring, summer and early autumn – appallingly muddy bits from December to April" (*kentwalksnearlondon.com*). Nevertheless, it was memorable for a great pub notice spotted on the door of the Rock at Chiddingstone Hoath (see picture). I can concur that the Rock is indeed a proper pub!



I am ashamed to say that I missed a big chunk of walks in and around August (most unlike me). My only excuse is that a fair bit of the time was spent in Yorkshire. In September, we had walks from Susan (Camer) and Brenda (Ryarsh) which covered some of the Northern parts of our walking area. Into October, we had a beast of a walk which went up and down (about 5 times!) a section of the North Downs, starting at Thurnham from the Black Horse. Even the last bit back to the pub was uphill! The intrepid group who walked that day are pictured alongside the stone-carved Millennium village sign at Detling.



Eileen led us from Cudham on a great walk from the Recreation ground – a lovely sunny day, with some good climbs. Lunch

afterwards was at the impressive Blacksmith's Arms, notable for its speed of service. Next we went from Burrswood with Diana which covered bits of the Wealdway and the Tunbridge Wells Circular. As usual, a great meal at the Crown in Groombridge to finish. On November 5<sup>th</sup> (Bonfire night), Janet led from a new car park (to me anyway) called Bushy Willows in Ashdown Forest. Another gorgeous day, as shown in the photo taken from the high point in the forest (Gills Lap) at the site of a plaque commemorating AA Milne and EH Shepard.





There was also a root "bridge" over a stream in the forest (with a nice bit of autumn colour) which we thought worthy of a picture – very unusual.

Susan led us from the mega car park in Cranbrook, starting in the town, seeing a number of notable buildings - the mill, the church and Mr Tooth's hat factory (he was surely in the wrong job). It was a bit of a poor day weather-wise (drizzly) but the second half of the walk was through a lovely woodland section (Angley Woods) where the autumn colours were spectacular. We have a few walks left before Christmas, so let's hope for some bright, sunny days!
